He's waded upstream ever since, "and really only started to learn anything, thanks to this chapter." After graduating (a couple times) from UW-Stevens Point, Mike works as an audiologist in Watertown where he lives with his wife, Kathy.



Mike continues to enjoy his free time in and out of the water in Central Wisconsin in the Iola area. However his angling travels are hardly limited to Wisconsin, he regularly travels to many of the western states including Wyoming, where he earned the "Cutthroat Slam Certificate" from Wyoming Game and Fish Department for landing the four native cutthroat trout sub-species: Yellowstone, Snake River, Bonneville and Colorado.

You'll also find him in Canada tossing big streamers for pike as pictured on Lac Seur, Ontario.




# CHAPTER MEETING JULY 13 TAKE A TRIP TO NEW ZEALAND

### **FLY TIERS — THE NEXT GENERATION**

On May 17 & 18, Wisconsin TU provided the opportunity for hundreds of grade schoolers to tie their first fly at the Midwest Outdoor Heritage Education Expo held at the Mackenzie Center in Poynette.

ALCTU'ers Jared Sagal, Renee Sagal and Mike Stapleton joined tiers from several other chapters to introduce the students to the wonderful world of fly tying, and each student created a terrific bluegill fly to take with them on their next fishing outing.



2,300 students from schools across central and southern Wisconsin attended the event, at which the fly tying tent was only one of about 40 different outdoortopic teaching and activity stations. All the students who tied a fly were really excited about getting out and experiencing Wisconsin's outdoors.

Four years ago, when the Expo was held in Beaver Dam, fly casting was also offered. Now at the Poynette location, the number of volunteers has dropped, and only fly tying has been available to the kids the last few years. All available instructor tiers stayed busy throughout the day, and it appeared that more youngsters would have had the opportunity to tie a fly if more tying instructors were present.

Since this event is on our own turf, consider this a call to ALCTU members to consider volunteering for one or both days at next year's event, which will be on May 17-18 at the MacKenzie Center. More tiers are needed, and it would be great if fly rod casting could be offered again, as well. The volunteers would assure you that this is really a great time and well worth participating in, and don't forget, some of these youngsters will be future TU members. A call for volunteers will probably go out in both this newsletter and Wisconsin Trout in early 2017, but please consider adding this to your calendar now.

### TROUT IN THE CLASSROOM SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED IN REEDSBURG

The Trout In The Classroom program, with two participating fifth-grade classrooms from Pineview School in Reedsburg, came to a happy ending with the release of 20 rainbow trout into Dell Creek in Sauk County on May 11th.

The trout were raised from small fry that were acquired from Nevin Fish Hatchery on a sub-zero day in January. Now five months later, all but three of the trout had grown to healthy fingerlings ready for release to a trout stream. DNR biologist Nate Nye assisted with necessary permits for the release as well as giving a very informative electroshocking demonstration before releasing the trout.

The kids got to see some large and


# POYNETTE SCHOOLS CONSERVATION CLUB ON ROWAN
